### The Nanticoke Lenni-Lenape Tribal Nation Pow Wow

Wide-open space, plenty of green grass and an abundance of delightful sun provided the backdrop of the annual "Nanticoke Lenni-Lenape Tribal Nation Pow Wow." Held on both Saturday and Sunday- June 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup>, this event compelled multitudes along the East coast to venture out to the Salem County Fairgrounds (Salem, NJ) to join in this celebration of Native- American culture...and what an exciting day it was!

The fairgrounds opened at 10AM with the "Grand Entry Processional" (of various tribes) scheduled to begin at 12PM. Seating consisted of open bleacher areas as well as designated tented sites- that prompted people to bring their own chairs.

While awaiting the "Grand Entry" kick-off, the audience was treated to beautiful, melodic music by a talented flutist. Something about his choice of music exuded such an aura of peace/calm over the entire atmosphere. A poignant prayer followed this musical selection. Then came that highly-anticipated moment when the tribes gathered to make their spectacular entrance. In a wide array of colorful, native regalia, the tribal procession followed the flag-bearers (flags represented the tribes and the U.S.). It was such a mesmerizing sight as the participants (including babies and children) proudly displayed their Native-American heritage in unity of voice and movement. The rest of the program involved a variety of dances and creative abilities. One fascinating performance was the utilization of five colorful hoops-by each individual on the field-to construct one, single circular figure.

In between the multiple events, there were opportunities to shop at a number of vendor stalls situated around the perimeter of the "arena." On display, and available for purchase, were various items such as art, jewelry, clothing, incense and artifacts reflecting Native-American culture.

Of course, food areas were also available and sold such fare as: buffalo burgers, wild game sausages, tacos, nachos, assorted "frybread" dessert treats, ice-cream, etc. Of note, was a candy/snack concession stand run by a familiar face-Ujima's own 1st Lady-Deacon Tanya Norwood. In an effort to raise funds for her tribal youth group, she bravely endured the heat of the day- and with a smile on her face!

Our own Pastor Norwood (who is a member of the Nanticoke Lenni-Lenape tribe) was also there at the vendor location to support his wife as well as his tribal nation. At times, he was also engaged in lively conversation with his tribal chief (Chief Gould) and others. At one point, he was even fielded interview questions (presumably regarding his tribe or the event) from a professor who apparently was motivated by a curiosity about this culture.

Overall, it was such a blessing to witness and support this event that recognized, honored and celebrated Native-American culture...and the heritage of our Pastor and First Lady.

This young man, King, also faces struggles of his own: his former comrades (who are drug dealers) antagonize him about finding a drug supply that King purposely buried to keep off the streets. They constantly trail him, brutally beat him and much more—all in an effort to get a hold of these drugs. In the meantime, there is also a romantic relationship blossoming with a young lady (whose life King saved in a car accident) and who is attracted to the man that King is- especially in light of his past, challenges and hopes.

As a Christian, King is also seen leading an effort to build a place which offers positive outlets for children in the community....kind of an antithesis to/of what he was engaged in before.

Finally, as the Lord would have it, we see His intervention of justice and blessings in King's life as he tries to do the right thing- despite the obstacles.

After the movie was over, Pastor Norwood delved a little deeper into the content- as it relates to Christian values and faith. ### "A Biblical Response to Abortion" - The Seminar

On a Wednesday evening in July, Dr. John Norwood, Pastor of Ujima Village Christian Church, presented a dynamic and sobering one-night seminar on the subject of abortion-from a Biblical perspective. This two-hour session was free to the public and offered some amazing insights into this highly- controversial issue. Utilizing a huge assortment of commentary via slides, video, graphic images, medical expertise and most of all- Scripture, Pastor Norwood masterfully defended the sanctity and value of human life-from its very start in the womb.



Viewing some of those staggering images really brought home the reality of what it means to destroy innocent life (whether in embryonic or developing stages) with no thought beyond, "It's my body, It's my choice." In reality, we saw that an unborn child is not really the woman's body, but actually another body- in and of itself...it just resides in the woman's body! That fact, alone, should offer much clarification to those who cling to the above-quoted notion.

It is truly important for Christians to have a Biblical stance on the subject of abortion because we live in a dark society where political views and social norms tend to impact judgement on this issue. The Word tells us that we ought to be ready to have an answer for/make a defense to anyone who asks us for a reason for the hope that is in us. (1Peter 3:15) Although that scripture may basically refer to our *salvation hope*...it also seems applicable to any other aspect of our faith- where we need to be ready to point out *why* we believe what we believe.

Without a doubt, Scripture offerings were- indeed-plentiful for this presentation. They, along with all the visual media, commentary, questions/answers and general discussion, made for a powerful argument for "pro-life."

We thank Pastor Norwood for all his meticulous labor in pulling together such <u>a wealth of information</u>-all in an effort to educate this congregation and any others who attended.

Theme (Youth): In the Wild- "Amazing Encounters

with Jesus" (Jn. 20:31)

Theme (Adult): **Amazing Encounters-** "Digging Deeper: Understanding Scripture"

During the first week in August, Ujima Village Christian Church held its annual Vacation Bible School studies. This year, utilizing the dynamic themes noted above, both adults and younger church members explored the character/person and the deity/nature of Jesus Christ.





Class categories and teachers included: 1.) The Children's Class (ages five- eleven)-taught by Sis. Shuquin Wimbush 2.) The Pre-teen and Teen Class -alternately taught by Deacon Tanya Norwood and Sis. Patricia Panniel 3.) The Adult Class-taught by Pastor Norwood. Each class had its own special area for instruction- as well as all the materials needed to ensure efficiency and success in lesson implementation. Due to a time constraint and the opportunity for others to give more perspective, actual content examination can be reviewed in another newsletter article.

To capture a glimpse of the goals/expectations of the teachers for their respective classes *and* to provide student comments /responses to those classes, the following questions were asked:

Q1- What was the goal/intention of VBS (Vacation Bible School) 2019? A- "To have a better understanding of Christology [the study of Christ-His nature/person]" -Pastor Norwood (Adult Class instructor); "To enlighten and enliven the Word of God. To have a special focus from the kids to consider God's plan for their lives" – Deacon Tanya Norwood (Pre-teen/Teen instructor); "To get the children to learn about Jesus and remember something learned from the lesson" – Sis. Shuquin Wimbush (Children's Class instructor)

**Q2-** How would you measure the success of class/achievement of the goal? A-"Everyone seemed interested and were engaging" – Pastor Norwood; "They gave a great presentation. They need to pursue God, but they can't catch Him...He catches them!" – Deacon Tanya Norwood; "Some were leaders, others needed help-but all were willing! – Sis. Shuquin Wimbush

Q3- Were there any memorable or unexpected moments? A- "The study of Christ led to a question/discussion on the Trinity. It isn't specifically mentioned (in the Bible) but definitely proclaimed!" — Pastor Norwood; "Having Nelson (Ruiz) in class...he held his own!" — Deacon Tanya Norwood; "I was impressed with the memory level of the children." — Sis. Shuquin Wimbush

Student Responses/Comments... Q- What will <u>you</u> remember about VBS 2019? ANSWERS: "That God and Jesus is the same person." – Sis. Kathy Rawls (Adult Class); "The true definition of the Gospel." – Sis. Adelia Clark (Adult Class); "When (young) Jesus asked his parents why they were seeking Him and wouldn't they know that He must be about His Father's busines" [An allusion to when Jesus' parents thought Him to be lost as they traveled from Jerusalem to Nazareth. However, He was actually found lingering behind in the temple at Jerusalem.] – Jordan Everett (Teen Class); "Relating our lesson to real life/world problems. I'm passionate and would like to live the Word and incorporate it into daily lives." – Malayna Cherry (Teen Class); "Doing the crafts" - Christopher Weeks (age six- Children's Class); "Doing the crafts, reading and learning about Jesus." – Riley Ivory (age eight-Children's Class); "Doing the crafts." – Isaiah Hardwick (age nine-Children's Class)

Following the lessons on the last day of VBS, each class did a presentation in the Fellowship Hall over a tasty meal. Later, Deacon Tanya Norwood generously provided gifts to all teachers and student participants.

# "Friends are Hard to Come By" - A *Special Delivery* from Deacon Pamela Hill on Luke 5:17-26 Synopsis by Sister Sandy Baez









Luke 5:17-26 is the story of how Jesus forgives and heals a paralyzed man. Throughout scripture, specifically the New Testament, we know that Jesus' mission on earth was to teach, heal, and save His people. Luke explains that Jesus was to heal and forgive those who sought the truth, the faithful and the repentant. In this story we learn that Jesus is in a crowded home filled with Pharisees and teachers from all of Galilee. The house was so crowded that this one paralyzed man, whom was being carried on a mat by his friends, was unable to enter the house. This man sought to meet Jesus so that he could be healed. His dedicated friends, despite their inability to enter the crowded house through the front door, carried the man to the roof of the house and lowered him down into the house in the middle of the crowd, right in front of Jesus. At that moment Jesus forgave his sins. Yet, the Pharisees and teachers questioned Jesus and accused him of committing blasphemy. Their denial of Jesus' divinity was the norm and not surprising to Jesus. Jesus went a step further and proclaimed his divinity and birthright by stating the fact that "the Son of Man" has authority on earth to forgive sins and heal. He then commanded the paralyzed man to stand up and go home. The man did as he was instructed, stood up, picked up his mat, and praised God for the miraculous healing. Likewise, the crowd rejoiced and praised God.

As pointed out by Deacon Hill, this story is not just about healing and forgiveness. This story focuses on faith, love, and friendship, all of which are hard to come by, especially in our society today. In Deacon Hill's depiction (see photos) the friends were Brother Pessimistic, Brother Persistent, Brother Patient, and Brother Prayerful.

Luke writes about true friendship in his story of the paralyzed man; men who truly cared for him; men he trusted; men who showed up at the right time and were adamant to fulfill their mission and take their friend to see Jesus for healing and forgiveness. This type of friend is hard to come by. What about your friends? Deacon Hill further stated that in our society today there are many types of friends: personal, professional, platonic, and passing. She defined a friend as a person one knows. A trusted member of society that is valued. Yet many times we question the validity of a friend and wonder why a person wants to be a friend. A personal friend is someone who shows up at the right time. One who prays for you without seizing; fasts on your behalf; and no matter what "has your back". A professional friend is not to be confused with a personal friend. Friendship is based solely on professionalism which has nothing to do with intimacy or personal traits. A platonic friend is a non-sexual friend. Platonic means spiritual, non-sexual, amicable, companionable and friendly. Society defines a platonic friend as a friend with benefits, but as Christians the truth is that there are no friends with benefits. These types of friends are called spouses. Last, there are passing friends, which are close friendships that don't last. They typically last for a season and move on. What about your friends?

As Deacon Hill pointed out, in Galatians 5:22-2 "the fruits of the Holy Spirit are love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control". We must learn how to maintain our friendships with the fruits of the Holy Spirit or we will find ourselves having passing and/or toxic friends.

Additionally, we must realize that maintaining friendships is painful – "not fracture free". Jesus had friends who denied and betrayed Him so we must be careful of passing friendships which can become toxic. Proverbs 27:17 (NIV) states "As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another." Toxic friends work to have you stray from God. True friends don't let friends go to hell. We must carry everything to God in prayer for God forgives and saves. The Lord is our healer, our redeemer, our savior, and our <u>only</u> true friend. Like the paralyzed man and his friends, we are called by Christ. We come to Him sick, paralyzed by sin, and unable to walk. Yet through His amazing grace and mercy we are forgiven and healed. What about your friends?

### World Reformed Fellowship Conference 2019

In August, Pastor & First Lady Norwood attended the World Reformed Fellowship Conference in Jakarta, Indonesia. The theme was "Storming Seas." On September 11, Pastor Norwood made a multi-media presentation on their journey and on the conference. Indonesia is made up

of a chain of islands that are between Southeast Asia and Australia. It is the fourth most populous country in the world. 87% of all Indonesians are Muslim. 12.7% of all of the world's Muslims live in Indonesia. There are more Muslims in Indonesia than in all of the Islamic countries of the Middle East combined. The law allows for anyone to convert to one of the recognized religions, but attempting to convert a Muslim to Christianity can result in being persecuted. Reports from Indonesian missionaries, who for their security had to use alternate names to protect their identities and required that no photos be taken of them.

The World Reformed Fellowship (WRF) was hosted at the headquarters of the Reformed Evangelical Church of Indonesia's "Reformed Millenium Center." The sessions covered many issues confronting biblical Christianity around the world, with a major issue being many churches and denominations no longer following scripture in their policies and practices (referred to in the many presentations as "Biblical Amnesia"). To protect the WRF from the increased worldliness that is plaguing other church denominations, associations, and fellowships, the WRF business session unanimously approved: 1) The WRF Theological Commission Statement of Reformed Theological Identity; 2) that those who violate the Statement may be removed from membership; and, 3) granted The WRF Board the authority to act on this.

The WRF, with which Ujima Village Christian Church is in membership, promotes Reformed thinking, a Reformed world and life view, fosters evangelism and strategies on missions, church planting and theological education, and promotes international communication for the further advancement of the Gospel. The people of God, with diversified cultural and ethnic backgrounds, are one in Christ. God has enabled WRF to express the unity of the church through cooperative agreements based upon the same Biblical, evangelical, and missionary vision.








### **International Days of Prayer for the Persecuted Church**

A woman in India watches as her sister is dragged off by Hindu nationalists. **She doesn't know if her sister is alive or dead.** A man in a North Korean prison camp is shaken awake after being beaten unconscious; **the beatings begin again**. A woman in Nigeria runs for her life. She has escaped from Boko Haram, who kidnapped her. She is



pregnant, and when she returns home, her community will **reject her and her baby**. A group of children are laughing and talking as they come down to their church's sanctuary after eating together. Instantly, many of them are killed by a bomb blast. **It's Easter Sunday in Sri Lanka**. These people don't live in the same region, or even on the same continent. But they share an important characteristic: They are all Christians, and they suffer because of their faith. While Christian persecution takes many forms, it is defined as any hostility experienced as a result of identification with Jesus Christ. From Sudan to Russia, from Nigeria to North Korea, from Colombia to India, followers of Christianity are targeted for their faith. They are attacked; they are discriminated against at work and at school; they risk sexual violence, torture, arrest and much more. In just the last year\*, there have been:

- Over 245 million Christians living in places where they experience high levels of persecution
- 4,305 Christians killed for their faith
- 1,847 churches and other Christian buildings attacked.
- 3,150 believers detained without trial, arrested, sentenced or imprisoned

These numbers are heart-breaking. And yet, they do not tell the whole story. James 1:2-4 says "Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance." That joy is what we see when we hear and work with Christians all over the world who suffer because they serve Jesus. God cares for His people, and He will never leave or forsake them. Millions of Christians around the world are persecuted for their faith daily. From Pakistan to Kazakhstan, Nigeria to North Korea, Christians routinely face discrimination, harassment, violence and even death for their faith in Jesus. Their suffering is unimaginable.

The Bible in Hebrews 13:3 command Christians to pray for those suffering as if they themselves were suffering. In other words, the Bible calls us to not only remember those who suffer but also to identify with them in their suffering. In keeping with this scriptural command, the International Days of Prayer for the Persecuted Church (IDOP) has united millions of Christians in prayer for the suffering Body of Christ around the world. After all, as the Bible says: If one suffers, we all suffer.

Over the years, the IDOP has served as a platform to highlight the stories of persecuted Christians and mobilise the global Church to respond to their plight. Moreover, in so doing, the IDOP has also been a source of solidarity and encouragement to persecuted Christians by reminding them that they are part of a larger, global family of believers.

We believe that God uses the prayers of his people to strengthen and deliver suffering saints. However, in order to pray for these suffering brothers and sisters, we must first listen to their stories. In other words, we must hear their cry.

We invite you, therefore, to join us this year on 3rd and 10th November as we unite globally to pray for the persecuted. Let's pray that in spite of the pressure and persecution, our suffering brothers and sisters —where ever they may be in the world — would stand firm in their faith, hold fast to the promises of God, and live victoriously in Christ. ### Pastor Norwood, a Visiting Professor to the Persecuted Church

From October 31st to November 13th, Pastor and Sister Norwood will be in Yangon, Myanmar (what used to be called Rangoon, Burma) supporting the newly formed Myanmar Theological Seminary. Pastor Norwood is participating with the World Reformed Fellowship associated educational mission organization "Timothy Two Project International," which states it is "committed to equipping and training indigenous pastors and ministry leaders with the essential truths of the Christian faith so that they can train others. This way, the mandate from



Christ in the Great Commission to 'make disciples' can be accomplished in areas of the world where there is little or no formal biblical and theological training available." Pastor Norwood will be serving as a visiting professor teaching an intensive graduate level course for Christian ministers on the front lines of ministry in this predominantly Buddhist country. As we observe the International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church on November 3 and 10, the Norwoods will be working with ministers of persecuted Christians in Myanmar. Please keep our pastor and first lady in prayer as we also pray for our Christian brothers and sisters in Myanmar.

Over the last year, Myanmar Christians have seen their churches closed and burned as the Communist-inspired United Wa State Army performed acts of persecution against Christians, detaining and abducting believers. The army holds immense power and has intensified its fight against insurgent groups, as well as ethnic minorities (which include Christians). More than 100,000 Christians live in IDP (internally displaced person) camps, deprived of access to food and health care.

In predominantly Christian states like Kachin State, Karen State or in Northern Shan, even well-established historical churches are being attacked. Fighting increased in 2018, adding thousands more to the IDP camps that are already ill-equipped to provide for the huge numbers of people. In daily life, converts are persecuted by their Buddhist, Muslim or tribal families and communities. Communities who aim to stay "Buddhist only" make life for Christian families difficult or impossible by not allowing them to use community water resources. Christians in rural areas additionally suffer from the brutal and almost forgotten long-term war the Burmese army is fighting against insurgency groups, especially in the north.

On January 31, 2018, two Christians disappeared in Mansi township in Kachin State, last seen in custody of the army. Their bodies were found in March with signs they had been tortured.

According to a report in July 2018, the Burmese army destroyed more than 60 churches in 18 months, including Christian schools.

In October 2018, the UWS Army detained almost 100 pastors and forced 40 Bible students to join its ranks in northern Myanmar's Shan State. While 20 have escaped, 20, all women, remain (as of January 2019).

In the dominant Buddhist culture, converts are discriminated against in various ways. In one report, a teacher refused to give a Christian student a list of questions to prepare for tests that was provided to others.




