#### **Living in the "Upside Down"** by Pastor Norwood

It is been a challenging season. Nothing has been left unaffected by the Coronavirus Pandemic. We have had to "social-distance," "lock-down," rely on the Internet and telephone for our communications. We have watched the numbers of those infected continue to increase, along with the number of those who have died. Neither the Korean War nor the Vietnam War claimed as many American lives as COVID-19, and it has only been a little more than three months after the first cases on our shores. Little conveniences suddenly have become a challenge to negotiate. Getting a haircut, or your "hair did," grocery shopping, pharmacy pickups, going to the movies, or going out to eat, are all but a memory - at least for now. Borrowing from television series "Stranger Things," my daughter said that it was like living in "The Upside Down," which is a fanciful place that looked like the normal world but where reality was completely altered and scary. This is the way many people feel today. Our first responders and essential workers have been on the front lines in hospitals and law enforcement and food marketers and shipping and delivery and sanitation workers have continued to keep things going even while we have all been living in what seems to be the "Upside Down." We have kept these brave individuals in our prayers as they continued to struggle, placing themselves at a higher risk than most of us may be able to completely understand.

This pandemic has been called a war. And in many ways it is. We have casualties. Hundreds of thousands injured and tens of thousands dead. The sick cannot be comforted by the touch of their loved ones and those in mourning bury their dead with few embraces as the restrictions and limits to gather - even for funerals - have impacted our way of grieving. This is one way that the upside down is not like war, because we cannot gather to even comfort one another in the manner that we would do if it were not for the danger of simply coming together. Nerves are on edge. And, sadly, even while many people are demonstrating a higher level of civility through acts of self-sacrificing charity, we are also seeing far too many instances of shortsighted immaturity and irrational outrage over reasonable precautions recommended and implemented in an effort to stop the spread of this deadly disease.

But of this we can be certain... OUR GOD IS STILL GOD, EVEN IN THE "UPSIDE DOWN"... JESUS CHRIST IS LORD EVEN OVER THE "UPSIDE DOWN." Even though we may not understand his ways, for they are much higher than ours, we can trust in the fact that there is purpose even in the most painful of situations and, because he holds all things under his control, there is nothing that can separate us from the love of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ or the destiny that he promised to all of those who are truly his disciples.

We have been forced to minister in new ways. Because we have continued to worship online and over conference calls and video calls, we are reaching people that had not attended our worships or Bible studies before. People have testified about growing in grace. Our homes have been turned into houses of worship. We are continuing to give God the glory in spite of the circumstances, as we should! This pandemic is dividing the mature from the immature and the faithful from the foolish. It is causing those who truly trust in the Lord to rely on him more than ever before. Perhaps the "upside down" is a proving ground for many of us where we are learning powerful lessons about the grace of God and trusting in him and his promises with an eternal outlook. Let us not lose the lessons we are learning while living through the "upside down."

During this pandemic, it is difficult to discern truth from fiction. At times, I become agitated because of the behaviors of our government and our society. While I am not a doctor, scientist, nurse, or epidemiologist, I am an educated and knowledgeable concerned citizen. I also hold the roles of mother, grandmother, sister, aunt, and daughter. However, the most important title that I hold is Woman (Child) of God. I am one of God's saints; beautifully made; called to bear witness; called to live a Christ-like life; called to spread the Gospel. As such, clarity on defining the term, coronavirus, and the current COVID-19 strain is essential to relieve others and myself of the agitation, anxiety, and hopelessness.



Although born again in Christ over 20 years ago, it wasn't until about five years ago that I really took a deep dive into my faith. I was urged to do more, to think outside of the box and work harder for the Kingdom of God. I was compelled to study and learn more. There are seven ways to put on the armor of God and fight the fight. With joy, we must:


- 1. **Pray** "<sup>16</sup> Rejoice always, <sup>17</sup> pray without ceasing, <sup>18</sup> give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." (1 Thess. 5:16-18, ESV)
- 2. **Abide in Christ** trust Him "<sup>5</sup> ... with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. <sup>6</sup> In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths. (Proverbs 3:5-6, ESV). We must abide in Jesus' love for us.
- 3. **Take in God's Word** Studying scripture and truly mediate on the truth allows us to live Christ-like lives.
- 4. **Praise and Thanksgiving** we must praise God without seizing for our spiritual blessings with a joyful heart.
- 5. **God's Restoration** that comes from the joy of salvation
- 6. **Salvation** Contemplate your salvation and heaven to come
- 7. Focus Keep focused on God and know that He is good



With no gatherings allowed for funerals, surely, this was upsetting-yet understandable. I felt compelled to just comfort where I could.

#### Actions That Helped/Help Me

On a personal level, this pandemic has reinforced my daily regimen and need to have prayer/intercession/devotions- as well as weekly fasting. Although we know that the Lord is ever-present with us, there are times when He actually allows us to *personally sense* His mighty power/presence. In those times, I feel especially comforted, blessed and encouraged in the faith. I'm grateful for that wonderful experience during this particular time- as well.

On a lighter note, with this additional time on my hands, I have a chance to be more creative with my culinary skills-preparing meals that I had little time for before. There is also room/balance for me to catch up on my more casual reading and watch some great suspense movies on TV.

Overall, it is my sincere hope that my prayers (along with those of others) will touch God during this crisis. However, I must remember, "Not my will, but Thy will be done."

I receive national geographics because I enjoy nature. The scriptures tell us these things will happen, but I am seeing how it's affecting wildlife and nature in places I may never go to. It's affecting societies and cultures and all kinds of changes and adjustments it's causing here and across the globe, in places like the Netherlands. It is really something to witness.

The greatest challenge has been not being around people; especially the people I love. I really like seeing people smile and I'm definitely looking forward to getting out and about in God's time. I get lonely but I say "God, I know I'm not alone."

## The Blessing of Ujima From Almost 3,000 Miles Away! By Sis. Treca Adams (Pastor Norwood's Niece)

When my uncle, Pastor Norwood, sent out an invitation to the family to join Ujima's "Time for Truth" Adult Bible Study, I calculated the time it would start in California, where I reside. I was excited about the opportunity to study the Word with him and Ujima's church members, since I had always lived so far away, and was not able to visit. The time of Bible Study was optimal for me to participate-allowing me to still be part of my local church's online services. From the first time I joined, it has truly been a blessing for



me, especially during the time of COVID-19. The breaking down of the Word, verse by verse by Pastor Norwood, and the wonderful questions posed by the congregation, has made the scriptures come alive for me. Scriptures that I have read and reread for years have been illuminated like never before! Praise God!!

I hadn't shared with my uncle, but prior to COVID-19, my family and I were making plans to move to another nearby city. When the restrictions were imposed on Los Angeles County, I wasn't sure how I would meet the deadline to find another property, get us moved out of our current home, and keep everyone safe. The burden was weighing on me as the days passed- without a clear answer or plan in sight. I felt the anxiety and stress of so many unknowns surrounding my family.



One Sunday, after the Ujima Adult Bible Study, I asked my uncle if he was free to talk, and he called me. During Bible study that day, as we read the scriptures, I was touched by the goodness of God... how His very nature is good, and the fact that He is the author of goodness. I thought about how this unprecedented time had led me to join my uncle and Ujima church members for this Bible study, how the Lord was using the pandemic to reach people in new ways, and how He was using it for good. As I shared this with Pastor Norwood, he cited, Romans 8:28, "ALL THINGS work together for good......" Now, I have read and known that scripture for a very long time, but it was in that moment that it became more real to me than ever before!

I thought about my current predicament with moving, and the fact that the Lord is able to turn even this stressful situation, into something good. That very day, on April 5th, I sat down with my two daughters and an index card. I told them that we were going to give our new house to the Lord. I asked them to tell me the things they thought we needed in our new home; they even added a couple of desires that went beyond our immediate needs. We prayed over our new house, and aligned three scriptures (that I wrote on the back of the card) with our prayer: Psalm 20:5, Psalm 37:3-4, and II Samuel 7:11.



That same day, we noticed a bird that kept flying right to our front door. It kept resting directly on a wreath that was hung there. A day later, we saw that it was a dove, and it was bringing twigs and building a nest in the wreath. Several days later, we saw that the dove had laid two little eggs, and was nesting right on our front door. As I continued to search online for suitable homes, I pondered the meaning of the dove and the eggs. Doves seemed to be a symbol of peace and the eggs, a new beginning. I prayed for the Lord to reveal to me what it all meant. I felt the Lord tell me that He wanted me to know He had heard our prayers, that He would meet us right where we were and bring a promise of peace. The two little eggs meant that, not only would He answer prayers, but we would also have choices.

I want to share with you that on May 1st, we solidified our new home- in the midst of a pandemic! Thoughts on Holy Week by Sis. Sandy Baez

To my Church family I write this letter to you with love! My desire to worship with you compelled me to write this simply to wish you peace and thanksgiving and to let you know that I miss you all sincerely.

As you know, due to the Coronavirus, our Pastor and First Lady have worked diligently to continue to minister the Word and keep our congregation together. Our Worship and Study services are temporarily being held online and by teleconference. The sermons and Bible study recordings are posted on the Ujima website. Additionally, a secure donation application with instructions on how the congregation can continue to worship through giving of tithes and offerings has been posted on the Ujima website. Praise be to God for the Blessing that is Our Pastor John Norwood and First Lady Deacon Tanya Norwood. During our prayer services, we continue to uplift the first responders, doctors, nurses, city, state, and federal leaders, our children and families, and all of those infected or affected by this horrific pandemic. We give praise and glory to our Lord Jesus Christ for keeping us safe; for enabling the doctors, nurses, and scientists to not only provide immediate medical assistance, but for working together to develop therapies and medications to combat and maintain this virus known as COVID-19.

We thank God for uniting our world and praise Him for allowing nations to come together and share supplies, best practices, and data analysis so that leaders worldwide can strategically manage and combat this invisible enemy. At Ujima we mourn our separation and our inability to gather together in person as one body in Christ to worship and glorify our Lord and Savior. We pray that the Lord bring an end to this pandemic so that we can be reunited!

Not being able to gather together for communion is heartfelt by our congregation. And now, as we prepare for Holy Week our hearts are heavy and saddened because we will not be able to gather as one. Despite these challenging times, as Christians and true believers, I'd like to remind the congregation of the significance of our commitment to remain focused on the Lord and our obligations to reading His Word, staying in communion and prayer, and worshipping our Lord through giving.

With that said, I'd like to remind you that Holy Week is the most sacred time of the year for us and fellow Christians worldwide. As a saint of Christ I felt obligated to provide our congregation, and all believers who read this, points of meditation that we can focus on during our physical separation and our inability to commune and break bread. During Holy Week, Christians must recall the events leading up to Jesus' death by crucifixion, and his resurrection.

Holy Week reminds Christians of God's sacrifice of his son, and also God's love for his people. Christians learn much about Jesus through the last week of his life. For example, you may have noticed that during Lent until Good Friday, Ujima's color is purple which is symbolic of penance prior to Christ's crucifixion. Jesus was forced to wear a crown of thorns and a purple cloak as the people mocked Him. Purple is the color of royalty to welcome the coming of a King and yet it also symbolizes Christ's pain and suffering. Although we are prohibited from receiving palms and communion on Palm Sunday remember the significance of this day commemorating Jesus' entry into Jerusalem to observe Passover.

Scripture reminds us that Holy Monday is the day on which Jesus cleansed the temple. Matthew tells us, "Jesus entered the temple courts and drove out all who were buying and selling there. He overturned the tables of the money changers and the benches of those selling doves. 'It is written,' He said to them, "My house will be called a house of prayer, but you are making it 'a den of robbers.'" (Matthew 21:12-13).

#### **Thoughts on Holy Week (Continued)**

Holy Tuesday is when Jesus underwent various challenges by the Pharisees and Sadducees over subjects such as paying taxes to Caesar and questioning Jesus on the source of His authority. This day Jesus spoke against the Pharisees - 13 "But woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you shut the kingdom of heaven in people's faces. For you neither enter yourselves nor allow those who would enter to go in." (Matthew 23:13).

Holy Wednesday was the day on which Judas betrayed Jesus to the Sanhedrin. Luke wrote "3 Then Satan entered into Judas called Iscariot, who was of the number of the twelve. 4 He went away and conferred with the chief priests and officers how he might betray him to them. 5 And they were glad, and agreed to give him money. 6 So he consented and sought an opportunity to betray him to them in the absence of a crowd." (Luke 22:3-6).

Maundy Thursday is a big celebration at our Church as Pastor commemorates the first Eucharist, the Washing of the Feet and the Last



Supper of Jesus Christ with the Apostles. During the Last Supper, Jesus identified that Judas would betray him, and that Peter would deny him.

Good Friday may seem an ironic title for the day of Christ's death for it is a sorrowful, awful day for the followers of Jesus. But it is also a day of celebration for the Lord completed his work as the living son of God on Earth, atoning for our sins so that we might be forgiven and receive salvation. We must not only remember his agony and torture, we must glorify Him for his sacrifice and salvation.

Brothers and Sisters we may not be able to be together physically during Holy Week, but in prayer, meditation, and study we must honor and remember the last week of Jesus' life on this earth. The most important day of all is Resurrection Sunday. The greatest focus of the week is the suffering, death, and the Resurrection of Jesus Christ and the events that led up to it. During these days, we suffer with Christ out of gratitude for our salvation so that we might identify with him, and serve and honor him.

nder normal circumstances Holy Week is a time that we clear our schedules of unnecessary activities. Yet because of our world's current war against COVID-19 we are given an opportunity to truly clear our minds and hearts and be fixed on Jesus. Focus on what He has done for us.

As the Bible and our Pastor have taught us, remember that the most important event in history is Jesus' resurrection. It is the central principle of Christian theology. Not only does the resurrection witness to the power of Jesus Christ, the resurrection also proves to us that Jesus is the Son of God and Messiah. Jesus said, "I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die" (John 11:25). Without Christ there would be no resurrection unto eternal life with God in heaven. The astounding thing about the power of Jesus is that He does more than give life, He is life, and that's why death has no dominion over Him. In resurrecting from the grave, God reminds us of His absolute sovereignty over life and death.

Our God is a God of order, intention, and purpose. The world is going through a horrible pandemic but God is in control! We are not to be fearful or anxious. We are to stay grounded and focused on Him. Many are on the front lines of this war, many are working from home, many have reduced work schedules, and many may have lost their employment. But not one of us has lost Christ Jesus who "will never leave you nor forsake you." (<u>Deuteronomy 31:6</u>; <u>Hebrews 13:5</u>).

Join me in staying focused, diligent in worship through prayer, worship, and thanksgiving! Remember and Celebrate Holy Week! Commune with Christ Jesus! Witness to others! Love each other!

#### Ujima Celebrates Black History Month by Sis. Sandy Baez

Sojourner Truth - 1797-1883 Jordan Everett Presentation 2/9/20

Brother Jordan Everett (15), one of Ujima's teens, and part of the Audio and Drama Ministries' provided a summary of a cherished and beloved Christian Saint, Sojourner Truth. Despite the slight presentation mix up, Jordan took the lead by taking charge of "Wisdom Keeping" and providing our young children with a close and personal summary of Sojourner Truth.

Born into slavery in New York in 1797, Sojourner's birth name was Isabella (Belle) Baumfree. A fun fact about Sojourner was that her first language was Dutch and when her first owner died she learned English. She converted to Christianity in

1820 and felt commissioned by Christ to escape with her daughter to freedom in 1826. In 1828 she was one of the first women to successfully challenge and win a case against a white man in court when she fought to recover her son. Sojourner devoted her life to the abolitionist cause and women's suffrage movement. She spoke at the first national Women's Convention in Worcester, Massachusetts.

In May of 1851, she delivered her famous "Aint I a Women? speech. She also advocated for black soldiers in the Civil War and spoke with Abraham Lincoln about her beliefs and her life experience.



<u>Sojourner's Famous Quotes</u>: "Religion without humanity is very poor human stuff;" "I am not going to die, I am going home like a shooting star;" "Truth is powerful and it prevails;" "Then that little man in black there, he says women can't have as much rights as men, 'cause Christ wasn't a woman!' Where did your Christ come from? Where did your Christ come from? From God and a Woman! Man had nothing to do with Him."

Giving God all the Praise and Glory we Salute the Saints who have passed on to Glory and paved the way for us today. We praise God for Brother Jordan and his presentation and for leading "Wisdom Keeping" allowing our young children to praise and pray for our Lord Jesus Christ.

#### Oh Freedom.... Blacks in the Revolution

About thirty people gathered in our fellowship hall on February 6th for a "listening session," sponsored by the New Jersey Historical Commission's Semiquincentennial Initiative in preparation for the 250th birthday of the United States. A long set of display panels were set up, with little known facts about the New Jersey's African American contribution to the Revolutionary War. The session was to get public feedback on ways to ensure that the whole story of NJ's part in the revolution is told.

The little known facts, much of which has not been included in the school curricula of our state, is that about 20% of those who fought were black. Even though legal slavery ended in New Jersey in 1804, forced apprenticeship of African Americans continued for many years under law.



One of Ujima's Acolyte's, and part of the Audio and Drama Ministries', Acolyte Johnny Weeks (16), provided a summary of a cherished and beloved Christian Saint, Mary McLeod Bethune. Johnny shared his presentation during "Wisdom Keeping" and provided our young children and congregation with a summary of ms. Bethune.

One of the last of 17 children born to Samuel and Patsy McLeod, Mary was born on July 10, 1885, in South Carolina. She was most recognized for being a black educator, civil and women's rights activist, and a government advisor to Franklin D. Roosevelt, allowing African Americans an advocate in government. In the early 1900s, she founded a college that set the standards for today's black colleges. One of her biggest accomplishments was first opening up an all girl's boarding school in Daytona Beach and later the school became a college that merged with the all-male Cookman Institute to form the Bethune-Cookman College.

Mary McLeod Bethune was truly an inspiration and icon to the community! She was a mother, educator, activist, advocate, and a successful businesswoman who co-owned a resort in Daytona, Florida and a co-founder of a life insurance company in Tampa, Florida. Mary lived a full life and passed on to glory on May 18, 1955, in Daytona, FL. 19 years after she passed, her life was celebrated with a memorial statue in Washington, DC. in 1974, and 11 years a postage stamp was created in 1985.

Giving God all the Praise and Glory we Salute the Saints who have passed on to Glory and paved the way for us today. We praise God for Brother Johnny and his presentation.

The movie, entitled "Overcomer," follows the journey of a teenager who is the product of a highly-dysfunctional family. The teen was raised by a bitter aunt who blames the girl's father (and his substance abuse) for contributing to the death of her sister/the girl's mother. This aunt has allowed her resentment to spill over to the teen- causing poor communication between them. An element of mendacity also prevails...the teen was told (by the aunt) that her father was also dead.

As a high school student now, she has her share of trouble and challenges. However, her life soon takes a turn when she becomes interested in participating in the sport of track and field/running. As time goes by, at school, the teen also becomes actively involved in a Bible study (her journey in becoming a Christian) with the help of a school counselor. Additionally, she is unaware of the fact that her father is actually alive, locally hospitalized and dying. Coincidentally, this man/her father also had a talent/history of being a great runner during his younger years.

Meanwhile, while on a hospital visit, the track/field coach of the young lady accidentally encounters her sick father. As an unlikely friendship ensues between the coach and the girl's father, the coach soon discovers this father-daughter relationship between his runner and the hospitalized man. He then proceeds to arrange for the two to meet. Presuming that her father had died some time ago, the teen (and her dad) both experience an awkward and emotional moment- when the two finally meet each other. Subsequent visits with her dad help to establish more of a comfort level *and* a recognition of their common interest in the sport of running.

From that connection, the father was eventually able to proudly serve as the "bedside coach/cheerleader" for his daughter in her upcoming running competition. Needless to say, with her dad's help, the young lady did win the championship for her high school. In addition to winning that competition, came the restoration of family relationships that were lost in the past. The movie concluded with a look at how this young lady continued to be a source of encouragement/inspiration to others. She was seen ministering through providing Bible study for others-as well as becoming a motivational speaker

What a blessing to be in attendance at such a fine and inspirational dinner/movie event!














#### "Biblelympics 2020" By Sis. Naomi Cullum


In the end, everyone was still a winner. An array of wonderful and functional prizes awaited all who had participated courtesy of Deacon Tanya Norwood.

Reflections from the frontline: While I don't mind saying I don't know repeatedly, and have no insights on what the pandemic "really" means or how it "really" started or whether it fulfills prophecy, I must admit, as a nurse it was especially difficult seeing so many people suffering and dying alone. Hospital visit restrictions prevented family members from being at their bedside. As I prayed about the situation, I was comforted by the realization that everyone goes into eternity alone. What benefit is a hundred individuals at your bedside, if you haven't made peace with God. While even if there is nobody at your side and Jesus greets you with open arms, surely you won't be lamenting those last moments alone! The things we do during mourning and periods of bereavement are primarily to provide comfort and promote healthy coping of the survivors. Let us be prayerful as the impact of these circumstances have altered the grieving process for so many. May we be encouraged and creative to find new healthy means to cope and mourn. Blessed are they that mourn for they shall be comforted." Matt 5:4

We have been bombarded with evolving information about the Pandemic almost on a daily basis. However, this presents an opportunity to raise awareness on a few issues that are relevant now and when the Pandemic is a part of our distant history.

Asymptomatic Carriers: After a person becomes infected with any disease, at some point they will usually develop signs and symptoms as the body's immune system kicks in to fight the agent. However, in some cases, an infected individual never develops any symptoms at all, yet they are actively continuing thru the lifecycle of the disease and possibly unknowingly transmitting the infectious agent to other people and surfaces. Research varies regarding the percentage of asymptomatic covid carriers, but please be aware this is a factor. This is another reason to be wise and follow the precautions to further protect ourselves and most importantly others. As Christians we should always consider the interests of others above yourself. (Phillipians 2:4)

I've always thought of courageous heroes in regards to situations like our First Lady's mother shared how she became a widow when her husband rushed into a burning building and gave his life trying to save a stranger's children. During the pandemic, society thinks of hospitals and considers healthcare workers as heroes but essential workers are making sure our needs are met in many different industries: grocery/food, gas, sanitation, prisons and more! While they are not rushing, these dedicated workers daily walk into workplace environments that often have increased exposure to undiagnosed (early covid cases), noncompliant covid positive cases and asymptomatic carriers. We acknowledge and appreciate their courage and we pray to God to protect and preserve essential workers. Let us lead the way and demonstrate our faith with actions: Let's be compliant with orders from authorities and cooperative with recommendations from experts. Christians should be wise and harmless examples at this time (Matt 10:6).

#### Handwashing & Masks:

Myth: Frequent handwashing, disinfection and masks are recent innovations introduced by the CDC and medical experts to avoid catching Coronavirus.

Facts: In the 1800's Florence Nightingale and her team of nurses revolutionized healthcare by introducing frequent handwashing and disinfecting surfaces/medical instruments after discovering soldiers were dying from catching diseases/infections in medical facilities ten times more than from combat injuries. The CDC and medical experts have been advocating for frequent hand washing every flu season but the pandemic has raised awareness to unprecedented levels. Handwashing is the gold standard intervention, the most effective and least expensive approach for preventing spread of all types of infectious diseases including: MRSA, VRE, diarrheal illnesses, open wounds, infections known to be especially resistant to strong antibiotics (VRE, CDIFF), Respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) and others.

Myth: Wearing masks/face coverings protects the wearer from catching covid.

Facts: Yes and No. There are many different types of masks but primarily two types being discussed in regards to the Pandemic. Basic medical masks/face coverings, and N95 respirator masks.

No, medical masks and face coverings do not protect the wearer from contamination from others; instead they primarily protect other people from potential germs from the wearer's nose/mouth. However, an additional benefit for the wearer is the mask helps prevent the wearer from contaminating themself by preventing them from touching their own face/nose with their hands after touching surfaces that may be contaminated.

Yes, N95 respirator masks do protect the wearer from catching covid; however supplies are much more limited. Even healthcare professionals preserve these masks for providing direct care to acute covid patients. Unless you are caring for someone confirmed covid positive, please abstain from wasting these valuable supplies so healthcare providers have access when needed.

**Health Disparity:** Disparity means an unfair difference or the condition of being unequal. Research shows a longstanding history of health disparities across the globe. In the United States it is most evident when poor and minority populations experience worse health outcomes and higher death rates than the general population with the same conditions such as: Heart Disease, Cancer, Diabetes, Hypertension, COPD, Stroke, and Kidney Disease. The Pandemic further highlights this troubling trend.

Myth: Asians and Chinese people caused Covid, seniors are more likely to be infected and blacks are less likely to be infected.

Facts: Such ignorance fuels fear, stereotypes, racism, discrimination and promotes unfair health disparities. Stigma and stereotypes are ungodly works of the flesh that promote hate, wrath and strife. Individuals ages 13 and older are most likely to be infected, those with compromised immune systems and/or poorly managed serious pre existing conditions are more likely to become seriously ill if infected. Blacks are actually being infected, becoming seriously ill and dying at higher rates than the general public due to health disparities. "Collectively, Black Americans represent 13% of the population in all areas of America releasing such data, but have suffered 27% of deaths." (The Color of Coronavirus, APN Research Lab)

Disparity is another catastrophic result of pervasive discrimination that means people will suffer and die after having less access to care, less information for sound decision making, less quality of care, for no other reason than their epidermal melanin levels (determines skin color). Descendants of Africans and Native Americans have the highest melanin levels. Will Christians shrink back from opportunities to reduce stigma and fight fear with facts? God forbid! We are called to be ambassadors of Christ and ministers of reconciliation. As peacemakers, Christians have a responsibility to promote love and equity amongst all of God's creation, for all souls belong to Him and we are healed by His wounds!

<u>Health Resilience</u>: Science Confirms the Bible Again!!! Unfortunately, Spiritual and Mental health are often overlooked in the context of health and wellness, but not in the Bible! Many spiritual disciplines have a beneficial side effect: they also promote a healthy lifestyle. The Bible says avoid excesses, waste & gluttony; today Health Sciences calls this "portion control". God calls us to be transformed by the renewing of our "minds", and some say, "do not fear" is the most repeated command in the Bible.

"Peace I leave with you; My peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled; do not be afraid." John 14:27

"You will keep whoever's mind is steadfast in perfect peace, because he trusts in you." Isaiah 26:3

Science shows sustained stress & anxiety (fear) hormones are devastating to homeostasis and depletes the immune system and wreaks havoc on your mind. Stress hormones (cortisol, epinephrine) trigger increased heart rate and breathing, opens vessels feeding the lungs and muscles, suppresses the digestive and reproductive systems and alters growth processes. These effects are beneficial and protective during a brief encounter with a perceived threat or danger. Like pulling an alarm, these hormones help ensure immediate access to increased blood and oxygen in anticipation and preparation to respond to an imminent threat with valiant efforts. However, God did not intend for us to live in a chronic state of anxiety, apprehension or fear; extending alteration of the body's natural cycles and states leads to dysfunction and sense of dys ease including increased prevalence of: depression, digestive problems, depression, headaches, memory/concentration problems, heart diseases, sleep problems, and weight gain.

The Pandemic brings unprecedented levels of worldwide toxic stressors which means an extended period of societal trauma. We all experience and express stress in various ways. Even now, His grace is sufficient and his strength is perfected in our weakness. Health experts use the term Health Resilience to describe the ability to cope with significant stressors in a positive way. Research shows proven health benefits for those with higher health resilience including: longevity, lower rates of depression, and greater satisfaction with life. Resilience can be protective in helping prevent the development of emotional, mental and physical complications and also supports the ability to maintain, adapt and even thrive despite adversity and hardships.

<u>Faith Based Communities Help Build Resilience:</u> Since resilience is a skill, it can be strengthened and developed through principles and methods such as connectedness and fellowship, rest and renewal, laughter and joy, reflective journaling, goal setting and planning, faith and prayer. Positive indicators of resilience are more prevalent in faith based communities including hope, forgiveness and a sense of wellbeing. These practical approaches are referenced in the Bible and remind us that our heavenly father instructs us for His glory and for our good.

"...let us consider one another in order to stir up love and good works, not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together......but exhorting one another..." Hebrews 10:24-25

<u>Laughter Boosts Immune System:</u> Laughter decreases cortisol, DHEA, and stress hormone levels and increases immune cells, and infection-fighting antibodies, thus improving your resistance to disease. Laughter triggers the release of natural chemicals (endorphins) that give us a sense of positive feelings and an overall sense of well being and even temporary pain relief. Low DHEA levels increase fatigue, depression, dry skin ,dry eyes and decreases exercise tolerance. [Humanity] has unquestionably one really effective weapon—laughter. .....Against the assault of laughter nothing can




